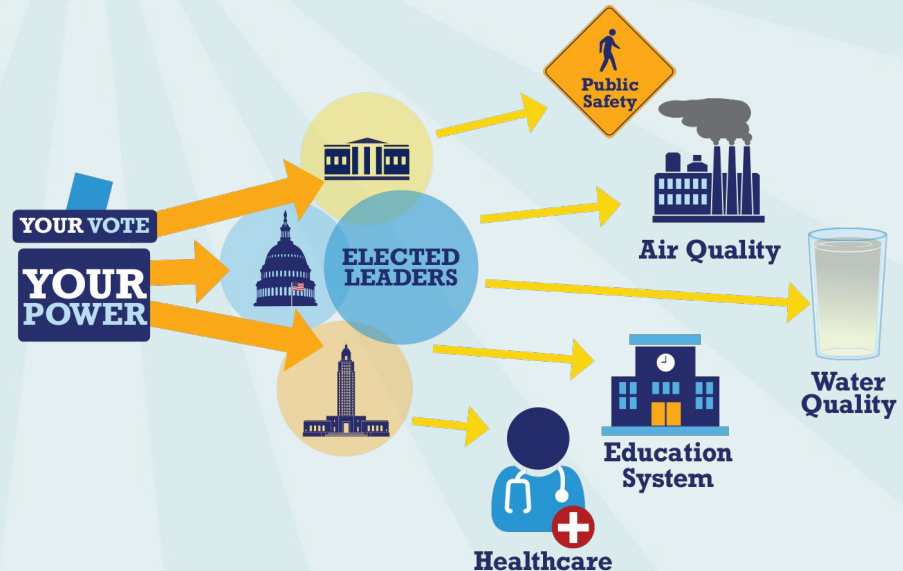

# What's on the Ballot **Statewide?**

**Constitutional Amendment No. 7 (ACT 246, 2022 - HB 298) -  
Provides relative to the prohibition of involuntary  
servitude and administration of criminal justice**

*Do you support an amendment to prohibit the use of involuntary servitude except as it applies to the otherwise lawful administration of criminal justice? (Amends Article I, Section 3)*

# What's on the Ballot **Statewide?**

## What does **Constitutional Amendment No. 7** mean?

A "yes" vote supports:

- removing language from the state constitution that allows involuntary servitude as punishment for a crime
- adding language to say that the section of the constitution prohibiting slavery and involuntary servitude "does not apply to the otherwise lawful administration of criminal justice."
- The constitution would be amended to say, "Slavery and involuntary servitude are prohibited."
- The 13th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, ratified in 1865, abolished slavery and involuntary servitude in the United States — except as punishment for someone convicted of a crime. **This amendment will reshape prison labor and make all work in prisons voluntary.**

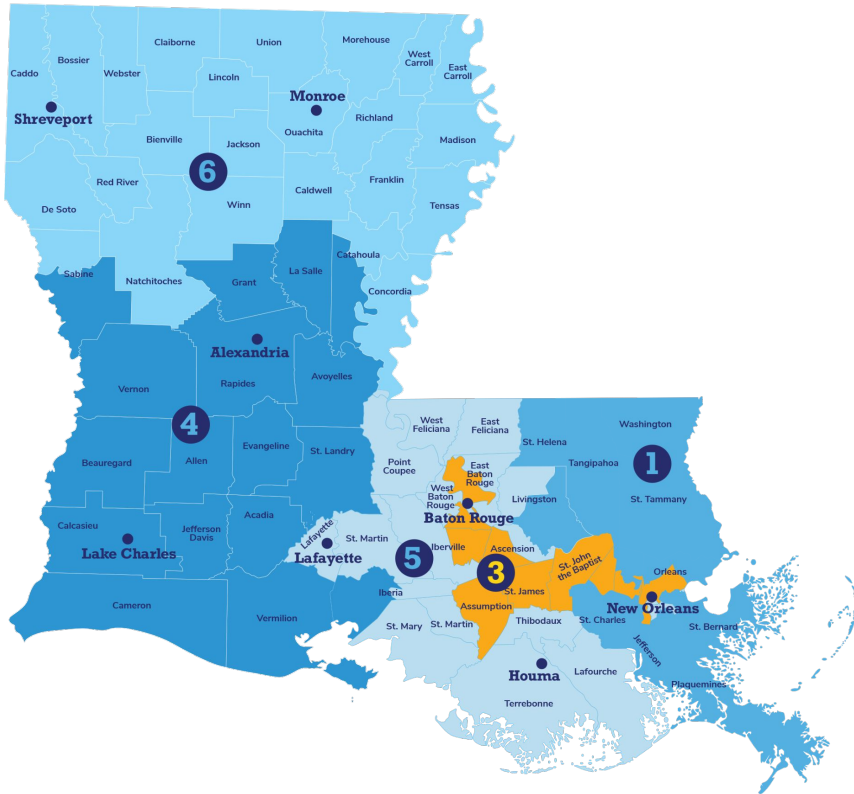
## **The Importance of the Public Service Commission**

Louisiana has 5 elected commissioners from 5 districts across the state. Commissioners serve 6-year terms, with a 3-term limit. That can add up to 18 years, which makes these very powerful positions.

As a constitutionally created and independent elected body, **Commissioners have complete and absolute power to take action to ensure safe, reliable, and reasonably priced public utilities.** They are not at the direction of the Governor or Legislature. **They have no one to report to other than the voters who elect them into office.**

With 2 of the 5 seats up for election this November, we have a chance to change Louisiana's clean energy future and work towards achieving climate goals. **Now is the time to make that change happen by voting in Commissioners in Districts 3 & 4 that are focused on moving us closer to where we need to be.**

# What's on the Ballot **Statewide?**

## **U. S. Senate Election**

The Senate has 100 members, 2 from each state, **who are elected to serve for a term of 6 years.** Senators must be 30 years of age, U.S. citizens for at least nine years, and residents of the state they represent. Similar to the House of Representatives, the Senate votes on bills, resolutions, motions, amendments, nominations, and treaties in a variety of ways. The Vice President of the United States serves as President of the Senate and may cast the decisive vote in the event of a tie in the Senate. The Senate also tries impeachment cases for federal officials referred to it by the House.

# What's on the Ballot **Statewide?**

## **U. S. House of Representatives**

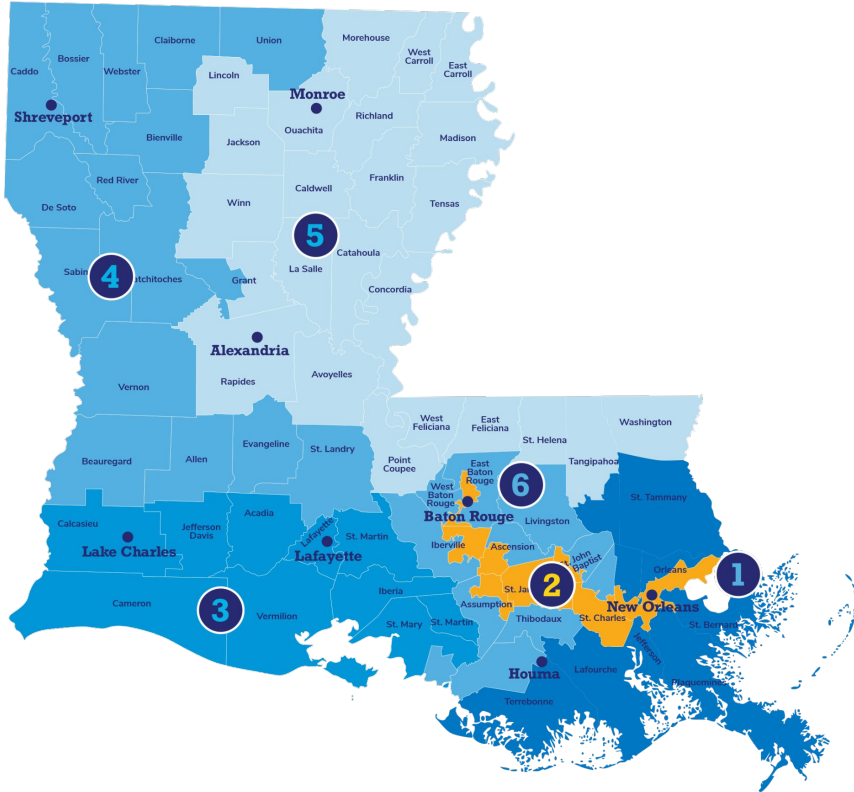
Each U.S. representative is **elected to a two-year term** serving the people of a specific congressional district. They must be 25 years of age, a U.S. citizen for at least seven years, and a resident of the state they represent.

Representatives introduce bills and resolutions, offer amendments and serve on committees. The House has several powers assigned exclusively to it, including the power to initiate revenue bills, impeach federal officials, and elect the President in the case of an electoral college tie. The House of Representatives is made up of 435 elected members, divided among the 50 states in proportion to their total population. In addition, there are 6 non-voting members, representing the District of Columbia, the Commonwealth of Puerto Rico, and four other territories of the United States. The presiding officer of the chamber is the Speaker of the House, elected by the Representatives. This person is third in the line of succession to the Presidency.

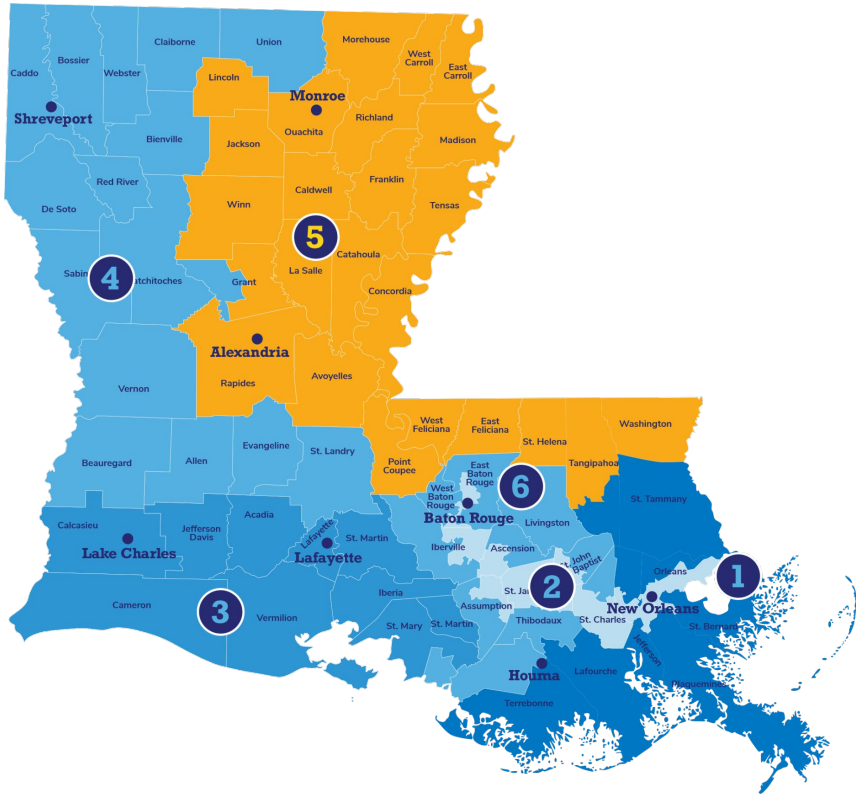

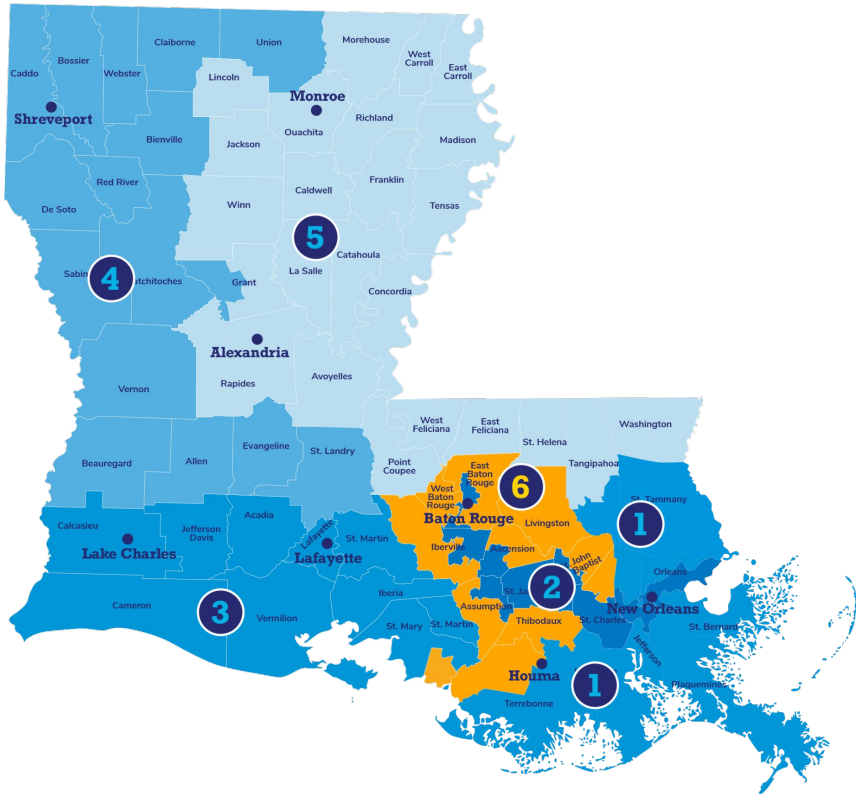

# What does a Voter Registration Application Need to Include?

## Applications must include...

- A current street address.  
*P.O. Box addresses are not accepted.*
- *A Louisiana driver's license number or Louisiana special ID card number.* If not, the last four digits of the social security number may be used.

## Power Note:

*Applicants can also attach one of the following items:*

- Current and valid photo identification
- Current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck or other government document that shows name and address



## How can someone obtain a Special ID (non-real ID)?

*The Office of Motor Vehicles will provide a special ID card (non-real ID) free of charge for voter identification purposes.* For more information on this:

# How Do I Register a Student With a P.O. Box?

## **If a student is registering and they have a P.O. Box Address what can they do?**

*If the applicant is a voter who lives on a college campus they can register using their University Mailing Office Address.*

# How old must someone be in order to Register to Vote?

- Louisiana residents as young as 17 can complete a voter registration application. However, residents as young as 16 can register to vote in-person at a Registrar of Voters Office or a Louisiana Office of Motor Vehicles.
- ***A voter must be 18 years old by election day in order to vote.***

# Can Formerly Incarcerated People Vote?

In Louisiana, if a person is not currently serving time in prison, including if they are currently on probation or parole, they can exercise the right to vote no matter what their prior conviction is. **YES, FORMERLY INCARCERATED PEOPLE CAN VOTE!**

Since March 1, 2019 any Louisianian who:

- 1.) *is off probation or parole; OR*
  - 2.) *has been on parole for 5 or more years; OR*
  - 3.) *is currently on probation*
- can vote.***

**In order to register, they will need:**

- A voter eligibility form (obtained from your local probation and parole office)
- A completed voter registration form
- a valid identification card (ID)

# Can Formerly Incarcerated People Vote?

## What are the rules on those with felony convictions registering and voting in Louisiana?

- Those who are currently awaiting trial in jail and not yet been convicted, are eligible to register and vote.
- Louisiana does allow returning citizens who are no longer incarcerated, with or without parole or probation, to vote *provided they have been out of prison for more than five years. They are eligible to register to vote after reaching a five year period.*

# Can I Give Incentives for Voter Registration?

**NO.**

**Incentives can NOT be given** to encourage people to register to vote.

# Using the Rock the Vote Online Form



## What if someone does not have a Louisiana ID?

1. Complete the form on Rock the Vote.
2. Choose “I do not have a LA State Identification Card or LA Driver’s License.”
3. The person registering will have to **provide at least the last four digits of their social security number**, if issued.
4. If the applicant doesn’t have an ID or a SSN, then the applicant has to **attach either a current and valid photo ID or a copy of a current utility bill, bank statement, government check, paycheck, or other government document that shows the name and address of the applicant.**
5. **Print the form** so you can mail it to the local Register of Voters Office

# Using the Rock the Vote Online Form



## What if there isn't a printer available?

1. Have the person **complete the form** on Rock the Vote per the previous instructions.
2. **Download the Form** by clicking "Print Your Form". A PDF of the form will open on a new page. Download the PDF then email the completed form to yourself and cc: the person completing the form as proof of completion. **You will need to print this form later.**
3. Once you have printed a copy of the completed form, **mail the form** to your local Register of Voters Office or the SOS Office...
