Voting Rights & Fair Representation

Core Narrative

- This fight is not about partisanship—it is about citizenship, fairness, and representation.
- When a group of people cannot elect the candidates of their choice, they do not have full representation. In America, where democracy promises that every voice and every vote matters, that is a fundamental failure.
- Sixty years after the Voting Rights Act was signed into law, we still have not fully realized the rights that people fought and died for. We cannot forget that **the 14th and 15th Amendments were designed to protect marginalized people and expand their power,** not to be weaponized to reinforce privilege.
- Fair maps are the foundation of fair representation. They are the tool that ensures we are a true democracy, where the will of the people, not the power of a few, determines our future.

Narrative Framing

- Historical: Tie current fights to the sacrifices of those who fought for the VRA. Frame today's battles against gerrymandering as a continuation of the struggle for equal rights, ensuring the legacy of civil rights leaders and foot soldiers is not forgotten.
- Community: Elevate local testimonials from people impacted by unfair maps and high costs. Share stories that show how a lack of representation leads to underfunded schools, inadequate healthcare, and neglected infrastructure.
- Fairness Frame: Position the issue as a matter of fairness, not partisanship. Emphasize that all Americans, regardless of their political beliefs, should agree that one person, one vote is a non-negotiable principle and the foundation of a working democracy.

Audience-Specific Frames

- Plack Voters: This fight is not over.
 Your voice is your power, and the future of our democracy depends on it. We rested, we healed, and now it's time to re-engage and fight again.
- Allies/General Public: The fight for fair maps is not a political issue—it's about fairness for everyone. This fight impacts everyone. Join us to ensure every American has an equal voice.
- South/First-Time Voters: Claim your seat at the table. Your future is on the ballot. Fair maps are about your ability to have a say in the decisions that will affect your life for years to come.



MESSAGING TOOLKIT:

Louisiana v. Callais Main Takeaways

Representation Is Citizenship

- Democracy only works when every community has a voice. Without it, our needs are ignored, our power is diminished, and the promise of a government that serves all of its people is broken.
- True citizenship means having the power to elect candidates who represent your needs and values. It is a fundamental right that should never be optional.
- The **Louisiana v. Callais** case shows us that even now, we are fighting for the very things the Voting Rights Act established. It is a direct legal challenge to the power of Black voters to elect candidates of our choice.
- Our citizenship depends on this fight. The outcome of this case will not just determine the future of Louisiana's map—it will set a dangerous precedent for the rest of the country.

Black Voters Need To Tap Back In

- Dlack voters have always been at the center of protecting democracy.

 Now, it's time to tap back in. The legal protections we assume are safe are under threat in cases like Louisiana v. Callais. We don't have time to waste.
- We rested, we healed, and now it's time to re-engage. Tap back in. We cannot sit back and let the country go backwards.
- With upcoming decisions like in Callais, there is no time to stand aside. We don't have time to waste. The legal protections we assume are secure may not be, unless Black voters, civil rights advocates, and allies stand firm now.

60 Years Later, Still Fighting

- The Voting Rights Act was a landmark to protect marginalized communities — but now its promises are at stake to protect the privileged.
- We must continue to honor the lives lost by continuing the fight for fair and equal representation. The Constitution's 14th and 15th Amendments were created to protect rights not to entrench privilege. We must restore their original purpose: safeguarding fairness for all.
- In the **Louisiana v. Callais** case, the Court is being asked to rule whether complying with the **Voting Rights Act** violates the **14th and 15th Amendments**. This directly questions whether communities can rely on the VRA to challenge unfair maps, putting the future of fair representation on the line.
- In this case, the state's attempt to limit the creation of majority-Black districts threatens the fundamental guarantees of the Voting Rights Act and the 14th and 15th Amendments. If this is allowed to stand, representation becomes optional not a right.
- If the Court allows the state to make representation optional, it could set a dangerous precedent that could threaten Black and Brown communities nationwide.

Fighting for Fair Maps

- Fair maps mean fair rules. Representation in our democracy should not be subject to political manipulation that allows politicians to choose their voters.
- This is not a partisan issue; it is a foundational issue.

 The fight for fair maps is about ensuring that every person's voice and vote holds equal weight.
- Fair maps are essential for true accountability and for ensuring that our government is a true reflection of the people it is meant to serve.
